Status of Funds

State Board of Accounts Called Council Conference

The regular meeting of the Hendricks County Council was called to order by President Eric Wathen on Tuesday May 2, 2017 with the following in attendance: Caleb Brown, Jay Puckett, Mike Rogers, Eric Wathen, David Wyeth, Brad Whicker, Financial Administrator Tami Mitchell, and Auditor Nancy Marsh. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Eric Wathen.

IN THE MATTER OF THE AGENDA

It was moved by Caleb Brown and seconded by David Wyeth to adopt the agenda as amended. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF THE APRIL 4, 2017 MINUTES

It was moved by Brad Whicker and seconded by Jay Puckett that the minutes be approved as submitted. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF THE PUBLIC HEARING ON THE FINANCING OF SOLID WASTE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Financial Consultant Greg Guerrettaz and Attorney Bruce Donaldson presented the Ordinance of the County Council Authorizing the Issuance of General Obligation Bonds for the Purpose of Providing Funds to Construct Certain Improvements and Pay the Cost of Issuance of the Bonds. Councilman Wathen asked about the process and why the request was just now coming to the Council. Mr. Guerrettaz and Mr. Donaldson explained that it was originally going to be a BOT Program (Build, Operate and Transfer) which was an alternative competitive process. When that process was declined the Solid Waste District looked towards traditional borrowing but under a General Obligation Bond and a Revenue Bond, tipping fees were specifically excluded for sources of payment.

Councilman Brown stated that on this project and other smaller financing projects, he was in favor of loaning from existing county funds. Mr. Brown stated his preference would be to loan the Solid Waste District the funding for the administration building if the funds were available and in no way harmed the sound financial status of the county. Mr. Guerrettaz stated that he believed the EDIT Fund was already quite obligated. Councilman Brown stated that the Commissioners had approved Resolution 2017-17 Recommending the Issuance of General Obligation Bonds of the County and Matters Related Thereto to keep the process moving and not cause additional delays.

Councilman Brad Whicker stated he was in favor of the bond process to keep a separation of the county and other quasi-governmental organizations and stated it was not his belief that the county should be in the loan business. Mr. Whicker affirmed that there is no taxpayer obligation except as backup and the bond would be repaid by tipping fees. Councilman Jay Puckett stated that he was in favor of loaning the money from current unappropriated funds at an interest rate competitive with the bond. Mr. Puckett asked for an estimate of fees for the final bond process. Mr. Guerrettaz stated his fee would be in the \$17,000 to \$20,000 range and Mr. Donaldson stated their fee would be in the \$25,000 range but he had done considerable extra work which would be in the range of \$10,000 in additional fees.

Mr. Puckett stated the county would earn approximately \$160,000 in interest and even more based on the proposed 10 year amortization. Solid Waste District President Marcia Lynch stated the board originally was looking at a 10 year term. Mrs. Lynch stated she would like to see the county finance the building and stated the Solid Waste District is very financially solid and has \$800,000 in their Rainy Day Fund.

The legally advertised Public Hearing was opened by President Eric Wathen. There was no comment from the public. It was moved by Jay Puckett and seconded by David Wyeth to close the Public Hearing. Motion Carried 6-0.

It was moved by Brad Whicker to approve Ordinance No. 2017-20 An Ordinance of the Hendricks County Council Authorizing the Issuance of General Obligation Bonds for the Purpose of Providing Funds to Construct Certain Improvements and Pay the Costs of Issuance of the Bonds. Motion died for lack of a second.

Councilman Mike Rogers stated that as a Councilman and a taxpayer he was appalled about the money spent and that the process got this far before it reached the Council for funding. It was stated that all fees are being paid by the Solid Waste District.

It was moved by Caleb Brown and seconded by Jay Puckett to loan the Solid Waste District up to One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) at an interest rate of no more than 3.5% for a term of 10 years from the Hendricks County Food and Beverage Fund. Motion Carried 5-1 (BW).

IN THE MATTER OF MADD RECOGNIZING LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

Lael Hill, President of the State Chapter of MADD was present to honor exceptional law enforcement for their commitment to stopping impaired driving. The assembly joined Ms. Hill for a standing ovation for the law enforcement recognized. Ms. Hill stated there were two officers from each of the departments in Plainfield, Avon, Hendricks County and Danville and they were presented certificates.

IN THE MATTER OF HUMAN RESOURCES

Human Resources Administrator Erin Hughes presented job classifications for Sheriff's Department Assistant Division Command of Support Services, Captain, Enforcement Division Commander, Corporal, Enforcement Lieutenant, Enforcement Sergeant, Detective Lieutenant, Detective Sergeant and Investigations Division Commander. It was moved by David Wyeth and seconded by Brad Whicker to approve classifications as presented. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF APPEALS ON JOB CLASSIFICATIONS

Council President Eric Wathen asked for the Council's pleasure in allowing an appeal process when a job classification was not agreed to by the office administrator. After discussion on the pros and cons, it was the consensus that Ms. Hughes contact Kent Irwin for a quote for providing

this service specifically for appeals. It was the consensus also, that if the requests for this review ballooned, the process may be cancelled.

Ms. Hughes stated that Kent Irwin had provided review training last week. Mr. Puckett asked if all offices were compliant in providing job reviews. Ms. Hughes stated that the Courts and Probation have not provided reviews. Probation Director Susan Bentley stated she was not in the position last year but intended to fully comply with the requested job reviews.

IN THE MATTER OF THE PROBATION REQUEST TO PAY ABOVE MIDPOINT

Susan Bentley, Probation Director, presented a request to hire a replacement probation officer at the required salary per the Indiana Office of Court Services plus an additional 5% for a Master's Degree for a total salary of \$48,046.95. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF THE EMERGENCY ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS

Prosecutor Pat Baldwin presented a request for a part time deputy prosecutor and a full time deputy prosecutor. Ms. Baldwin stated she is proactive in making plans for funding for a deputy prosecutor should the state eliminate funding for one of the state paid prosecutors who is retiring. It was moved by Caleb Brown and seconded by Brad Whicker to table number 1 until the June meeting. Motion carried 6-0. It was moved by Jay Puckett and seconded by Brad Whicker to approve number 2 in the amount of \$7,602.00. Motion carried 6-0. It was moved by David Wyeth and seconded by Mike Rogers to approve number 3 in the amount of \$2,218.00 and number 4 in the amount of \$2,218. Motion carried 6-0. It was moved by Jay Puckett and seconded by Brad Whicker to approve number 5 in the amount of \$92,500.00. Motion carried 6-0. It was moved by Jay Puckett and seconded by Mike Rogers to approve number 6 in the amount of \$659,254; number 7 in the amount of \$36,000; number 8 in the amount of \$3,000; number 9 in the amount of \$5,570; number 10 in the amount of \$15,200; number 11 in the amount of \$1,030; number 12 in the amount of \$15,000; number 13 in the amount of \$20,800; number 14 in the amount of \$5,806; number 15 in the amount of \$97,594; number 16 in the amount of \$3,221; number 17 in the amount of \$112; number 18 in the amount of \$1,126; number 19 in the amount of \$18,099; and number 20 in the amount of \$700,000. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF THE PARKS

Park Director Jeremy Weber gave an update on the Russell Property. Mr. Weber stated the Park Board understood the package offered was a starting point for negotiations but that was not the case the amount the seller offered is firm. The property is now on the market.

IN THE MATTER OF THE REALLOCATIONS OF FUNDS

It was moved by Brad Whicker and seconded by Caleb Brown to approve number 1 in the amount of \$1,190 and number 2 in the amount of \$1,500. Motion carried 6-0.

IN THE MATTER OF THE STATUS OF FUNDS

Auditor Nancy Marsh presented the Status of Funds report for the Council's review. Auditor Marsh stated the county's May payment, received this morning, was \$180,645.

IN THE MATTER OF ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Council, upon motion made by Brad Whicker seconded by David Wyeth and carried 6-0, the meeting was adjourned Tuesday, May 2, 2017 at 10:40 to be followed by a Benefit's Committee Meeting at 11:00 a.m.

DECLARATORY RESOLUTION OF THE HENDRICKS COUNTY COUNCIL DESIGNATING ADDITIONAL ACREAGE IN 70 WEST COMMERCE BUSINESS PARK AS AN ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION AREA

WHEREAS, the Hendricks County Council of Hendricks County, Indiana adopted a Tax Abatement Procedures Ordinance on October 7, 1997; and

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 6-1.1-12.1 allows an abatement of property taxes attributable to the redevelopment or rehabilitation of real property and the installation of new manufacturing equipment, new logistical distribution equipment, new research and development equipment, and new information technology equipment in economic revitalization areas; and

WHEREAS, Indiana Code 6.1.1-12.1-2 empowers the Hendricks County Council to designate revitalization areas;

WHEREAS, the Hendricks County Council has reviewed and informed itself about the status of the real estate described and depicted in <u>Exhibit A</u> attached hereto and made a part hereof by this reference (the "Real Estate");

WHEREAS, the Real Estate is located within the jurisdiction of the County Council for purposes set forth in Indiana Code 6-1.1-12.1-2;

WHEREAS, the County Council has determined that the Real Estate has become undesirable for, or impossible of, normal development and occupancy, and otherwise meets the definition of an economic revitalization area as that term is defined at Indiana Code 6-1.1-12.1-1;

WHEREAS, the declaration and designation of the Real Estate as an economic revitalization area and the allowance of deductions from the assessed value of new manufacturing equipment, new logistical distribution equipment, and new information technology equipment, new research and development equipment, and the redevelopment or rehabilitation of real property installed, constructed, or improved thereon, will encourage the development and improvement of the Real Estate:





Dear County Council:

Park superintendent Jeremy Weber and I met recently with county financial adviser Greg Guerrettaz and State Bank of Lizton president Mike Baker to discuss strategies for securing funding for Hendricks County Parks' immediate and long-term goals.

I have attached a summary of our meeting. Please note where I mention rewriting our Vision Statement (second paragraph). Greg advised that this rewrite should match up with our five-, 10- and 20-year project goals. Greg has worked with other county parks departments across Indiana.

It was both a productive and illuminating meeting and Jeremy and I left encouraged and with clear ideas of how next to proceed.

Greg has volunteered his advice for the time being -- advice that is deeply appreciated. We anticipate a subsequent meeting.

05-18-17 meeting report

Childhood lead poisoning is a significant environmental health problem that is preventable. Lead poisoning prevents children from reaching their full potential. Children ages six years old and younger are particularly susceptible to the effects of lead poisoning. Most children ingest lead through hand-to-mouth behavior.

In 2014, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) changed their "level of concern" from 10 micrograms of lead per deciliter whole blood ($\mu g/dL$) to 5 $\mu g/dL$. This is the reference level at which CDC recommends public health involvement. There is no safe blood lead level in children. Lead poisoning can affect nearly every system in the body; however it goes unrecognized because there are no obvious symptoms. Lead poisoning can cause learning disabilities, behavioral problems and, at very high levels, seizures, coma, and even death.

Recently, we received a letter from Dr. Jerome Adams, State Health Commissioner, making us aware of a Medicaid reimbursement opportunity. The Indiana Health Coverage Program will cover initial and follow-up comprehensive environmental lead investigations. Reimbursements are set at around \$282.85 for an initial investigation and \$101.32 for a follow up investigation. In the letter, he is encouraging all local health departments to develop capacity to conduct comprehensive environmental lead investigations.

We have a certified lead inspector/risk assessor on staff and regularly conduct environmental lead investigations with the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) resources. We do not have a portable lead paint analyzer and we have to coordinate with the ISDH to use theirs. Our Nursing department's intent is to increase testing and case management which will lead to an increase of environmental investigations. To increase our capacity and not rely on the scheduling through the ISDH, we would like to purchase a lead paint analyzer. Our Health Board is in support of this request. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Colleague:

I am writing to make sure you are aware of an important reimbursement opportunity that Medicaid has recently approved for comprehensive environmental lead investigations.

On January 26, 2017, Indiana Medicaid announced that effective March 1, 2017, the Indiana Health Coverage Programs (IHCP) will cover initial and follow-up comprehensive environmental lead investigation services for IHCP members with a confirmed elevated blood lead level. An elevated blood lead level is defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as a blood lead level of 5 mcg/dL or higher.

The IHCP will cover comprehensive environmental lead investigation services when services are billed by an IHCP provider enrolled as a Public Health Agency (provider type 13) and Local Health Department (specialty 130). Providers must adhere to current Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) rules per 410 IAC 29 (Comprehensive Environmental Lead Investigations). Reimbursement levels are set at a maximum fee of \$282.85 for the initial investigation and \$101.32 for follow-up investigations. To learn more about this reimbursement, please visit http://provider.indianamedicaid.com/ihcp/Bulletins/BT201709.pdf.

Due to the percentage of pre-1980 housing, lead hazard exposure continues to be an issue in Indiana. I encourage each local health department to develop capacity to conduct comprehensive environmental lead investigations or consider partnering with neighboring local health departments that have an established capacity to conduct comprehensive environmental lead investigations. To assist with developing this capacity, the ISDH is offering scholarships to the Lead Inspector/Risk Assessor class being held at the Environmental Management Institute in Indianapolis on June 5-9, 2017.
