







Median Age of Death
















2023 Naloxone Rescue Kit — Grant Activity Highlights


The Hendricks County Health Department had 94 remaining Nasal Naloxone Rescue Kits through a grant from the Indiana State Department of Health received in late 2021. 31 kits doses of naloxone were distributed throughout the grant cycle in 2023. Trained 50 Hendricks County laypersons or agency professionals in 2023, including laypersons, community organizations and businesses, and housing facilities. The Health Department utilized a second grant through Overdose Lifeline to provide 24/7 accessible naloxone through Naloxboxes in Brownsburg, Avon, and Plainfield. Through this program, we distributed approximately 266 doses of Naloxone in 2023.


HCHP Local Coalition Updates

In 2022, the Hendricks County Health Partnership collaborated with the Hendricks County Community Foundation and other community leaders to create a community-based action plan to equitably address behavioral health needs in Hendricks County through the use of American Rescue Plan Act funds. The goal of this initiative was to ensure that all residents have access to behavioral health and substance use services to be mentally healthy, free of addiction, or on the path to recovery. In 2023, we began implementing this plan by employing various strategies that would target specific needs. The Partnership is proud to report that in 2023, we were able to accomplish the following:

Partnership Accomplishments

- 1. Hire a full-time behavioral health resource navigator and client advocate based at our local homelessness prevention agency, Family Promise.
- 2. Train pastors on the basic knowledge of mental health and signs of distress through a series of workshops
- 3. Trains Hendricks County employers on mental health and substance use awareness, resources, and mental health first aid techniques.
- 4. Host a series of free art and music classes to those in drug-addiction therapy and mental health therapy through partnership with the Hendricks County Art Council.
