2022 Naloxone Rescue Kit — Grant Activity Highlights

The Hendricks County Health Department had 0 remaining Nasal Naloxone Rescue Kits through a grant from the Indiana State Department of Health received in late 2021. 50 kits (100 doses) of naloxone were distributed throughout the grant cycle in 2022.

Trained 60 Hendricks County laypersons or agency professionals in 2022, including laypersons, school sports staff, community organizations, substance use treatment facilities, and housing facilities.


The Health Department utilized a second grant through Overdose Lifeline to provide 24/7 accessible naloxone through Naloxboxes in Brownsburg, Avon, and Plainfield. Through this program, we distributed approximately 694 doses of Naloxone in 2022.





DISPOSAL PROGRAM








HCHP Local Coalition Updates

Involved community leaders and the Health Partnership met throughout 2022 to discuss ways to work more effectively as working groups. As a result of these meetings, the Partnership was restructured. Rather than having two coalitions and several groups in the county doing similar work, the new Partnership became an entity that combined the Substance Abuse Task Force, Mental Health and Wellness Coalition, Systems of Care, and DMHA Client Consultation Board. The Partnership now meets monthly as a large group, while special interest groups and subcommittees work on specific projects and issues.

• Partnership Accomplishments

- Participated in the creation and distribution of the Hendricks County Community Action Plan.
- Began primary data collection for 2022 Community Health Assessment.
- Began producing and distributing official community partnership newsletter.
- Hosted second annual Mental Health Fair and 5K, "Walking for the Health of it," and fundraiser, "Laughing for the Health of it".
- Responded to community crisis events via the Crisis Response Team.
- Published Winter/Seasonal Resource Guide.

- Assisted in setting up and running several COVID-19 vaccination clinics.
- Assisted IDOH in finding a location for a state run vaccination/testing clinic.
- Finalized After Action report for all COVID-19 related activities during 2020-2021.
- Attended 2022 NACCHO National Preparedness Summit in Atlanta.
- Finalized report on coverage of AM radio transmitter and began discussions to move to the new jail.
- Assisted in providing information during Plainfield warehouse fire.
- Conducted Family Assistance Center tabletop exercise and began planning meetings for potential future full scale exercise.
- Received inflatable tent to be used for future offsite activities.
- Received new storage trailer and wrapped for offsite clinic/response activities.

- Participated in recruitment events in Brownsburg and Plainfield.
- Conducted 4 quarterly meetings/trainings.
- Crisis Response Team logged 139.5 hours in response and team members participated in 96 hours of training.
