


2017-2021 Patients by Eligibilty Groups







2021 Naloxone Rescue Kit — Grant Activity Highlights


The Hendricks County Health Department had 0 remaining Nasal Naloxone Rescue Kits through a grant from the Indiana State Department of Health received in late 2021. 76 kits of naloxone were distributed throughout the grant cycle in 2021. Trained 31 Hendricks County laypersons or agency professionals in 2021, including laypersons, community organizations, substance use treatment facilities, and housing facilities.





HCHP Local Coalition Updates

In 2019, the structure of the Partnership shifted and reduced its number of coalitions to two. Since then, the Mental Health & Wellness Coalition and the Substance Abuse Task Force have been working to improve behavioral health needs in the county through a number of projects and events.

The Mental Health & Wellness Coalition was put under the leadership of the executive director of Mental Health of America of Hendricks County. Work in the coalition is centered around Mental Health Awareness Month, Suicide Prevention Awareness Month, and crisis response efforts.

The Substance Abuse Task Force has continued to assist the community through providing community grants that target substance use prevention.

• Mental Health & Wellness Coalition

- Hosted first annual Mental Health Fair and 5K, "Walking for the Health of it".
- Hosted Crisis Response Team trainings.
- Crisis Response Team was officially called out to respond to crises.
- Hosted annual Crisis Intervention Training for law enforcement officers.
- Hosted annual Suicide Prevention & Awareness Candlelight Vigil.
- Substance Abuse Task Force
 - Distributed \$82,670 of grants to help promote local substance use prevention efforts.
 - Supported and promoted substance use and mental health efforts, events, grants, and programs.



Preparedness Activities

- Helped set up and oversee several drive-thru immunization clinics around the county at Lucas Oil Raceway, Hendricks County Fairgrounds and Hummel Park.
- Worked with Brownsburg school officials to set up and run off-site vaccination clinic at White Lick Elementary School.
- Assisted in the installation and setup of the AM 1670 Public Information Radio. The radio is currently housed at HRH, with plans to relocate in the future. This radio can be used to provide emergency and non-emergency information to the public.
- Updated overall Training and Education Plan.
- Updated county Emergency Operations Plan.
- Assisted IDOH with site selection and setup of several state-run vaccination clinics.
