







Vital Records Documents Issued 2016-2020
















- Prevent Child Abuse Annual Hendricks Coat Exchange (Kids Fair portion cancelled due to COVID-19).

2020 Naloxone Rescue Kit — Grant Activity Highlights

The Hendricks County Health Department had 0 remaining Nasal Naloxone Rescue Kits through a grant from the Indiana State Department of Health received in late 2020. All 100 kits were distributed during 2020.

Trained 22 Hendricks County laypersons or agency professionals in 2020, including people from school corporations, mental healthcare agencies, law enforcement and corrections departments, community organizations, and housing facilities.





2020 Preparedness Annual Report

(Conducted midterm After Action Report of pandemic related activities)

Preparedness Activities

- Set up Joint Incident Command involving Law Enforcement, Fire, EMS, Hospital, and EMA to better communicate during pandemic.
- Assisted numerous area long term care facilities, assisted living, dental, and doctors offices with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) distribution.
- Worked with area hospitals to provide PPE through the Healthcare Coalition.
- Assisted in setting up and operating vaccination clinic at Hendricks County Fairgrounds.
- Worked with local Amateur Radio Operators to set up AM radio station broadcasting COVID-19 related information from various locations around the county.
- Updated county Emergency Operations Plan.
- Participated in the county wide Hazard Vulnerability Assessment (HVA).

Medical Reserve Corps

- Established Executive Committee and became setting up committees.
- Continued set up and planning of mental health Crisis Response Team (CRT).
- Applied for and received \$10,000 grant for setting up response for CRT and planning for future response activities.
- Assisted in setting up several flu shot clinics.
- Provided the web page to register temporary volunteers for COVID-19 response.
- Provided management software to schedule combined volunteer pool with HRH and register up to 2,000 volunteers.
- Assisted many families with groceries, pharmacy or other services during pandemic response.
- Registered up to 400 spontaneous volunteers through the MRC, will reach out after the COVID-19 response to gauge interest in continuing.
